9:15 – 10:00 **National Alliance for Drug Endangered Children: Bringing Disciplines Together.**
Lori Moriarty . Drug endangered children (DEC) are part of a very large, and growing population of children whose lives have been seriously and negatively impacted by dangerous drugs. Thousands of these children across the nation go unnoticed and do not receive the necessary care and treatment to heal from these abusive environments. If ignored and left unmonitored, these children continue to be victims caught in a cycle of drug abuse. The primary challenge with illegal substance abuse and DEC is in coordinating the social and political systems charged with preventing, intervening, and treating these cases.

10:15 – 11:45 **Concurrent Session I**

1A. **Meth 360.** *Sgt. Harold Adair, Tulsa Police Department and Mike Townsend, Partnership for a Drug-Free America.* The Meth 360 Program was developed by the Partnership for a Drug Free America. It is a part of a multi-media campaign which includes public service announcements / advertising, consumer public relations and an extensive online meth resource center at drugfree.org/meth. The Meth 360 Program is the local component that provides meth prevention presentations throughout the communities. The presentations are a cooperative effort at education involving law enforcement, prevention and treatment professionals.

1B. **Drug Endangered Children (Children at Risk).** *Officer Danielle Bishop.* This workshop will be an overview of the Tulsa protocol for dealing with DEC kids. Information on how to include DEC investigations into the already existing multidisciplinary child abuse investigations will be discussed. I will share some pictures from previous DEC cases, as well as statistics on the kids that tested positive and parents that completed treatment programs.

10:15 – 11:45 **Concurrent Session I - Continued**

1C. Best Practices for Prevention. Kelvin Hobbs, Arlinda Copeland, David Wright and Funnel Group This session will look at overall programs and prevention practices. It will also look at two Oklahoma counties that have implemented the Evidence-Based Programs: Too Good For Drugs (TGFD) and Creating Lasting Family Connections (CLFC). The Oklahoma Prevention Initiative will also unveil a joint media advocacy campaign for meth prevention.

1D. Advanced Meth Discussion: Dispelling Myths. *Levi Keehler, LADC.*
This presentation will utilize didactic, Socratic, and dialectic methods to educate participants on methamphetamine issues that are frequently ignored or missed by mainstream sources. Participants will have adequate time to discuss these issues and will learn from both the trainer and other audience members. This interactive format is designed to enhance learning potential for those participants that already know the basics surrounding methamphetamine.

1E. Effective Treatment Options (Access to Recovery). *John W. Gastorf, Ph.D., FICPP.* Director, Behavioral Health Services. The presentation will be an in-depth overview of the Access to Recovery Program. The ATR program expands treatment opportunities and recovery service options. Clinical services that are available within this program include both outpatient and inpatient treatment. The session will also introduce additional recovery support services.
